Accompanied by teacher Tamara Katami, the MUN director, and Mr. Daoud Dababneh, thirteen students composed of ninth and eleventh graders travelled to Genoa, Italy, to attend GeMUN '16.

A few weeks after that journey, fourteen students from 9-12 grades, accompanied by Ms. Duaa Al Daboubi and Mr. Pascal Matarweh, flew to Dublin, Ireland, to attend SAIMUN '16.

Currently, various seniors, alongside Mr. Elie Nino and Ms. Tamara Katami, are in Haarlem, Netherlands, debating in HMUN '16.

Genoa

The 13 students, accompanied by Ms. Tamara and Mr. Daoud, travelled to two Italian cities, Genoa and Rome, over the course of 9 days. The trip took place from the 24th of February till the 3rd of March.



The first four days of the trip were spent in the lovely Genoa, where the students took part in the Genoa Model United Nations conference whilst representing the NOSMUN club. Outside the conference, the days spent in Genoa were delightful, for they were filled with walks down its beautiful streets, the many visits to Christopher Columbus' house, the moments of silence spent in its magnificent churches, and the fun-filled visit to the aquarium along with the newly established obsession with penguins and seals.

Annual Book Fair

The National Orthodox School welcomed its students, parents, teachers, administrators and guests of all ages to the home of education itself, our main school library.

Starting on the 23rd of March with a welcoming opening ceremony, the book-fair introduced this year’s keynote speaker, Taghreed Najjar. Mrs. Najjar shared some of her life experiences and the struggle she went through before becoming a successful children’s books writer. Apart from the inspirational speech, directed by Miss Maram Abul-Hija was a play performed by a group of enthusiastic fourth graders which mainly focused on the importance of reading nowadays.

Intel Competition

We would like to congratulate our 10th grade student, Yousef Abul-Leil for his qualification for the global INTEL competition after winning the final project contest held by the ministry of education for his creation of a device that is able to safely teach students about nuclear radiation.



The idea came to Yousef when he was watching a group of IG students perform some experiments on nuclear radiation. He couldn’t help but notice that what they were doing required special safety gears and equipment that weren’t present. Moreover, He started doing some research on this topic finding out more about where this radiation could come from and created the Nuclear Waste Auto Detector. “It might be surprising how everyday uses can be classified as nuclear wastes; from banana peels to smoke detectors. These wastes are being dumped in land fields causing harm to all living organisms. My device is able to detect these wastes and dispose them correctly.” said Yousef.

He hopes that in the future the nuclear waste Auto Detector can be used in airports where it should be advisable to check for radioactive substances coming into and out of countries. If greatly developed, it can even help in recycling plants!

Considering how brilliant this device is, Abul-Leil said that it was unexpected to hear his name being called out, stating that he only entered the competition in the first place to see what it is. But with a little bit of encouragement from the physics lab technician Mr. Odeh Hindeleh and Miss Samar Saeed, he was⁴ able to emerge evermore victorious.

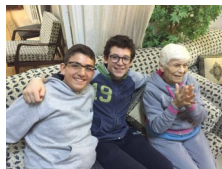
However, such programs are not only for older students,

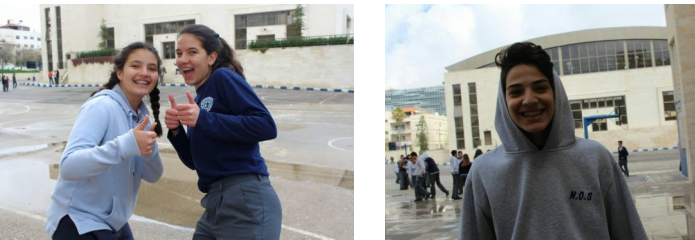

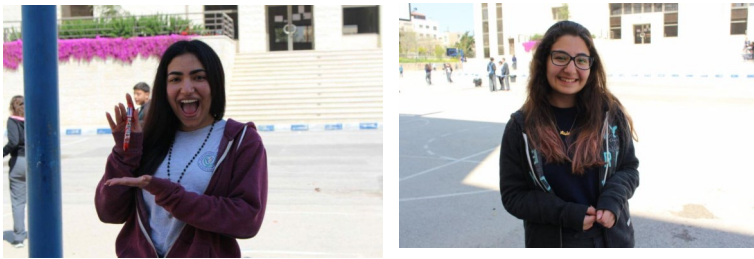

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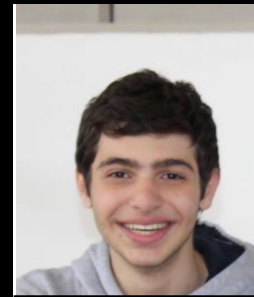
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
