after, many students started donating some of their unneeded items for the cause. They separated the items into groups and priced them, under supervision by Ms. Alexandra, taking into considera-




tion the state and age of each item.

Humans of NOS

Throughout the year, we have interviewed 22 people from the campus of our school. Those 22 hold different positions in school, come from different countries and have different backgrounds. It gave our Evolve staff a unique experience, and an important lesson. We learned to love and appreciate the diversity of people, and to embrace the differences between one another.

Every background story was interesting, and each person had a unique answer to a certain question and attracted interest in each answer. It showed that not everyone has been fed with the same spoon.

In this last issue of the scholastic year; we decided to

share the four of the twentytwo interviews since they mark the differences in which this project was all about.



One of those selected interviews was for student Ghazi

Karadsheh, which gained intriguing attraction on social media platforms. It's worth mentioning that this was his last year in school, and in that sake he commented: "I don't really want to leave here. It's (school) become like a second home to me. It's formed this protected bubble that shielded us from all the big responsibilities and challenges growing up, which I think I'll miss. There are definitely things I regret not doing, such as reconnecting with people I haven't talked to in years or not making the most of all the experiences and staying home instead. I kept telling myself 'you can do that tomorrow/ next month/next year' and here I am, about to graduate next month.

I'm making the most out of the time I have left here, so I'm quite happy with that, but never make the same mistake I did.. Always make the most out of high school. I swear that they'll be the best 4 years of your life as a teenager. You just need to let yourself run free sometimes., but also focus on studying."

Another HONOS interview was that of student Andrea Khoury. Andrea moved to Jordan from the UAE with her family, and was asked about her feelings towards moving to which she replied:



"I was afraid I wouldn't make any friends since it becomes harder to start from scratch at this age. But, when I came to this school I felt welcomed, then I realized that I made such close friends in a short period of time."



She was also asked if her moving here affected her relationship with her sister, Natalie. She said:

"It definitely did. In Dubai, my sister and I would see each other once a week. Now we're together all the time and we also have the same

friends so I think that moving here helped us become closer. It's a bit weird but I like it."





Another popular HONOS interview belonged to Mr. Ibrahim, who is an Egyptian janitor working at school. He was asked for his back story, and generously shared it saying (in a translated version):

"I migrated my homeland, Egypt, in 1994, seeking my daily bread. I left my family and previous life to make a living and to provide for my children.

I worked in several companies and organizations before I found a job at this school in 2009 after a friend of mine told me about it. Thank God it turned out very well, I'm happy and I'm treated in a very amazing way.




In my own perspective, living abroad can have a variety of effects on a person: One can see new places and countries; one can meet new people and learn their ways.


