

They are done all around the world by high school seniors. Some are counted as innocent ways of amusement, while others are said to be useless and unpleasant catastrophes.


During the 2018-2019 school year, as in previous years, the NOS Seniors "entertained" the school with their pranks.

### Just Leave Me Be

My story with bullying started in Middle School. Up to grade 5, life was great; I had so many good friends. But then I reached grade 6 and the school mixed the students in different classes. It was kind of hard because no one could understand me like my old friends. It felt like I was from a different world. I was surrounded by people but at the same time I was all alone.

I didn't fit in with my class, I was bullied for reasons I didn't (and still) don't understand. I used to go back every day to my house and cry, every second, every minute and every hour of every day. It caused me more and more depression. Then I started making new friends (or at least I thought they were). The stress and depression caused me to get a disease called Irritable Bowel Syndrome (IBS) that is related to the nervous system. After that I got another disease in the Thyroid gland. The doctor was shocked because this disease usually comes to 40+ year-olds.

My main problem was in 7<sup>th</sup> grade, when my "best" friend started to avoid me. I didn't understand why. Then I realized that she had listened to another girl who told her I said bad things about her. She thought that I was perverted because of a rumor a girl spread about me. So once when I was running during the break, I accidentally bumped into her chest, a very big problem arose at school that included my mother, her parents and many other adults. From that day on... nobody ever trusted me

Some people also bullied me because I like hairdressing (and I am good at it!). But not is not up to them to decide what I should or shouldn't like, and it is not up to them to say I am "this" or "that". No one can know what is inside me except myself, and I know very well, what I am and what I am not.

It's a terrible feeling when you feel that no one believes you, no one understands you. No one wants to be your friend. I started to think I don't want to continue life like this. I was afraid of life, and angry. But thankfully, there were always one or two good people that stood by my side. These are the people I know are true friends. Now I realise, it is not about how many friends you have, but who your friends really are.

My life is getting better. I am now in 9<sup>th</sup> grade; the school counselors and my Head of Stage have been a great support. I feel better, and I have friends, and I am taking care of my health. I am still bullied but I know that it doesn't matter what people think of me... this is me and I'll be the person I want to be.

So, I wish everyone would learn from this: That it's not right being friends with only the people in your class, and forgetting about them if they move to another class. It's not right not accepting new students in your class. It's not right spreading rumors about people and judging them; you have no idea what they could be going through in their personal life...

If every person would just think of how they would feel if someone was acting that mean way with them, no one would bully anyone else... if only.


